

# Animal Welfare (Kept Animals) Bill

Implementation of the ban on live animal exports for slaughter or fattening







#### Our aims

The Animal Welfare (Kept Animals) Bill makes it an offence to export, or attempt to export, livestock or equines for slaughter or fattening, either from or through Great Britain.

- Risk based approach
- Comprehensive and proportionate process accepted by industry to maximise compliance
- Focus on pre-export checks and regulation of trade
- Ensure protection of high risk groups

# Why are horses exported?

- Initial stakeholder engagement suggested high value performance/breeding
- Review of APHA data over 95% of exported horses registered status
  - FEI and Weatherbys data would suggest @ 20% of these are being exported for International competition, racing or TB's breeding/sales

## Future transport regime

To date we have had workshops to discuss maximum journey times for day-old chicks, pigs, broilers and other poultry, and cattle and sheep.

- Journey times for equines -18<sup>th</sup> July
- Representatives from across equine sectors
- Paper to be circulated to attendees shortly
- Discuss the proposed maximum journey time of 12 hours
  - What exemptions need to be considered (shows, competition, racing)
  - Additional criteria that should apply to protect horses on longer journeys.
  - How the proposal may impact on journeys that go through equine markets.
