

Vet workforce shortage



UK veterinary workforce shortages continue: sharp post-Brexit fall in EU-trained vets and limited domestic supply has created pressure across all sectors.

Demand for equine veterinary services is rising, but the pool of vets willing to work in equine practice is not keeping pace.

Workload and wellbeing concerns remain significant, with long hours and high on-call burdens cited.

Practical impacts — reduced vet availability, longer response times, and increased costs.

Investigation focused on companion-animal care



Many of the proposed remedies will impact on equine practices.
